## PASTORAL MESSAGE

#### A Favorite Saint

One of my favorite Saints is the holy New Hieromartyr and Equal-to-the-Apostles Kosmas Aitolos (1714-1779). St. Kosmas was born in 1714 in Mega Dendron, Aitolia, Greece, to a father who was a weaver and a devout mother.

He attended village schools, but was tutored by an archdeacon. He attended a school on Mt. Athos. He became a monk and later priest at Philotheou Monastery where he remained for two years. After a time, he felt a calling to do missionary work in Greece, especially in the remote areas where there was a lack of churches and priests for the many unbaptized adults.

As an aftermath of four centuries of Turkish oppression in Greece, Kosmas received the patriarchal blessing in 1759 to travel wherever needed, for however long, with complete independence, to breathe life back into Christianity in Greece.

Kosmas travelled in Greece, its islands, and Albania for 25 years, founding over 200 schools, as well as charities and rural churches. He travelled by foot, by donkey and by ship. By the 18th century, many Greek people lived in communities with no functioning Church. When he came to a village he would ask the villagers to plant a large wooden cross in the village square. Then he would mount a bench next to the cross and preach to the villagers about the love of God and the Orthodox faith.

His efforts eventually drew the attention of the authorities. The Ottomans tried him on charges of conspiracy and sentenced him to hang in August 1779 in Albania. However, one account reports that he prayed and gave up his spirit before this could occur. Saint Kosmas was glorified and proclaimed a Saint by the Ecumenical Patriarchate in 1961. His feast day is celebrated August 24.

Here is an important thought: Without the dedication and self-sacrificial ministry of St. Kosmas and others like him, what would have happened to the Orthodox Christian Faith in Greece during these dark days?

#### A few selected Passages From The Teachings of Saint Kosmas Aitolos:

LOVE: If we want to fare well in this life and to go to Paradise, and to call our God Father, we must have two loves: love for God and love for our neighbor. It is natural for us to have these two loves, and contrary to nature not have them. Just as a swallow needs two wings in order to fly in the air, so we need these two loves, because without them we cannot be saved.

So let us have love for God and for our fellow men. Then God comes and brings us joy and implants eternal life in our hearts, and we fare well in this life and also go to Paradise, there to rejoice forever.

Fortunate is the man who has these two loves in his heart, that for God and that for his brethren. He surely has God; and whoever has God has every blessing and does not accept sin.

Again, wretched is the man who does not have these two loves. Surely he has the devil and evil, and always sins. God, my brethren, asks us to have these two loves. As He Himself says in His Holy Gospel: "On these two commandments hang all the law and the Prophets."

Through these two loves all the Saints of our Church, men and women, attained sainthood and won Paradise.

## PASTORAL MESSAGE

Whoever has blessed love, firstly for God and secondly for his fellow Christian, becomes worthy of receiving the Holy Trinity in his heart. If you wish to be saved, seek no other thing here in this world as much as love.

Those of you who earn your bread by means of your toil and sweat should rejoice, because that bread is blessed; and if you give a little of it as alms it is reckoned as much.

But those who live by means of injustice and grasping should mourn, for what you thus acquire is cursed; and if you give alms out of these they do not benefit you at all, but these become a fire that consumes you.

The Martyrs won Paradise through their blood; the Ascetics, through their ascetic life. Now you, my brethren, who have children, how will you win Paradise? By means of hospitality, by your love for each other, by giving to your brothers who are poor, blind, or lame.

HUMILITY: The Christian needs two wings in order to soar upward and attain Paradise: humility and love. When the first order of angels fell from angelic glory and became demons, but the other nine orders humbled themselves and worshipped the All-Holy Trinity, and remained in their place and rejoice forever.

We, too, my brethren, must reflect what an evil thing pride is - that it cast down the devil from angelic glory and he will always burn in Hades - and that humility kept the angels in Heaven, and they rejoice perpetually in the glory of the Holy Trinity.

Let us then, my brethren, avoid pride, because it is the first daughter of the devil, it is a path that leads to Hades; and let us have humility, because it is angelic, it is a path that leads to Paradise.

CONFESSION: If you want cure your soul, you need four things. The first is to forgive your enemies. The second is to confess thoroughly. The third is to blame yourself. The fourth is to resolve to sin no more.

If we wish to be saved, we must always blame ourselves and not attribute our wrong acts to others. And God, Who is most compassionate, will forgive us.

FASTING: We who are pious Christians must fast always, but especially on Wednesday, because the Lord was sold on that day, and on Friday, because He was crucified on that day.

Similarly, it is our duty to fast during the Lent seasons, as the Holy Spirit illumined the holy Fathers of the Church to decree, in order to mortify the passions and humble the body. Moreover, if we limit the food we eat, life becomes easier for us.

Fast according to your ability, pray according to your ability, give alms according to your ability, and always hold death before the eyes of your mind.

KEEPING SUNDAY: Do not separate yourselves from Christ and from the Church. Do you hear the priest ringing the bells? Rise at once, wash yourselves, and go to church. Attend the Orthros (Matins) attentively and likewise the Divine Liturgy. We should not work or do business on Sunday. The profit that you gain on Sunday is cursed. Keep Sunday as a day dedicated to God.

THE JESUS PRAYER: This prayer should never be absent from you: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy upon me, a sinner."

## PASTORAL MESSAGE

Always say this prayer both with your mouth and with your mind, day and night, wherever you may be, whether eating, walking, working, or sitting. Always meditate on it, as it benefits you a great deal, frees you here from every evil, delivers you there from eternal Hell, and renders you worthy of going to Paradise, our heavenly country.

TEACHING OF THE SCRIPTURES: Heed all the thoughts of the Holy Gospels, because they are all diamonds, treasures, joy, delight, eternal life. The existence of many churches neither preserves nor strengthens our faith to the proper extent and in the proper manner, if those who believe in God are not enlightened by the Old and the New Testaments.

I have found the words and the commandments of Christ to be pure, holy, true, splendid, brighter than the sun; and whoever believes in Christ and calls Him God and lives in accordance with His teaching, contained in the Holy Gospels, is fortunate and thrice-blessed.

The Holy Spirit illumined first the holy Prophets, and they wrote the Divine Scripture; second, He illumined the holy Apostles; and third, He has illumined the holy Fathers, and they have explained the books of our Church, in order that we may know how to conduct ourselves.

Our Faith has been made secure by wise and learned Saints who both explained the Holy Scriptures precisely and have enlightened us through their divinely inspired discourses.

#### Stewardship in Action

This spring, four parishioners shared heartfelt reflections on what stewardship means to them. Their words, alongside images of our community in action, remind us that stewardship is more than a pledge—it's a way of life rooted in love, service, and faith.

In researching the definition of Stewardship, two elements in the definition got my attention. One element involved "the responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." Another element in the definition was related to the "practice of careful planning and management to ensure long-term sustainability."



Regarding the first definition element of "responsible management of something entrusted to one's care":

Over 75 years ago, in July 1950, I was baptized at the first site of the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church when it was located at 620 N Street. I was probably among the last few children to be baptized at the N Street location before it moved to Alhambra Blvd in 1951. My parents, George and Anna, fostered the importance of Orthodox faith in our family. They, along with my sisters Andreanna and Vassie and myself, would travel from Roseville in a 1942 Chevrolet Coupe to Sacramento, down Old Hwy 40 (Auburn Blvd) before Hwy 80 was built, to attend services at the Annunciation Church in Sacramento. My parents set the example at an early age regarding being active and involved stewards of our Orthodox Faith.



Many of the early founding members of our church, as well as my parents, came to this country at a very young age. They worked hard, sacrificed, and always had the importance of faith in God as a primary focus.




The selfless efforts of these early Annunciation faithful stewards for the past 100 years, along with the blessings of GOD, is why we still have our beloved Annunciation Church today. So, I feel a very serious sense of responsibility and duty to continue, through stewardship, to do what I can to leave our church in better stead for future generations.



Regarding the other element in the definition of stewardship, specifically "sustainability": Yes, sustainability involves monetary support, but beyond that, and more importantly, it involves the sharing of blessings and God-given talents with others so that we may serve GOD. It also encompasses the importance for us as Stewards to welcome, share, and bring others to our faith.

Within a Parish, there is a lot of effort needed to provide "sustainability." I liken this process to that of "rowing a boat." If you have ever tried rowing a boat, and if you only have one oar, or if you have an uneven number of oars, the boat may be unbalanced and not get to the place where you want it to be very easily. Or, if you







You may also need different types of oars that possess certain characteristics of weight, size, composition that can help with moving the boat successfully forward. This is the same for our Parish. We need the support of different parishioners with varied gifts, treasures, or talents to help with sustaining and growing our parish.



I'd like to take this opportunity to share an observation that I have seen evolve the past few years and provide a commendation to many of you, including some of our younger parishioners and younger families. I am so very pleased to not only see very familiar faces continuing to help throughout our parish, but I have been noticing newer and different faces taking their "oar," sharing their talents, becoming faithful Orthodox Stewards, and actively involved in supporting our parish in so many different roles. This effort is definitely helping to ensure continued "sustainability" of our parish.



Getting back to why I continue to be a Steward...Besides what I outlined earlier in my talk today... that I feel a sense of responsibility to those faithful Annunciation stewards who have gone before us and entrusted us with this beautiful parish, I also feel a deep and sincere sense of "gratitude." Gratitude to GOD for all the blessings in my life and my family's life. He has always been there for all of us.



As I referenced the metaphor of the "row boat" earlier in my talk related to "sustainability," I would like to reflect on another type of "boat"... specifically, "the boat of life," the boat that we are all in. For me, the church continues to be the one place that offers me and my family balance and stability in moving through the choppy waters of life. As I enter the church each week, it provides me with the "armor of God," as described in Ephesians, in order to navigate those difficult and tough times. It also continues to offer me a sense of renewal, hope, and solace as I face life's challenges, and for this I am so very eternally grateful to GOD and our church.



In closing, Fr. James would always say that we are not saved alone, but we are saved together. So, I ask you all to continue to join together, pick up your "oar," whatever it may be, that will help to support our beloved Annunciation. Please share your blessings and God-given talents so that we may move together as one in glorifying God, being mindful of the legacy that has been entrusted to us.

When I was first asked to speak about stewardship, I'll admit—my first thought was, "Me?"

But then I paused and realized—"Why not me?" For one, I am a steward and passionately believe in sharing our time, talents, and treasures with our church. And two, this is something we all need to be thinking about, talking about, and, most importantly—living out.

Too often, we associate "church" with the building we walk into on Sundays. Or, on weekdays for Greek School, dance practice, baking, or festival prep. Yes, our church home is beautiful. But the Church is so much more than brick and mortar. It's the Body of Christ. It's us. It's this community. The people who show up, give back, and carry our faith forward.

Think about those who came before us—the yiayias, papous, godparents, parents, and friends—who built this parish from the ground up. They didn't just show up. They sacrificed. They gave their time—driving us to church, teaching Sunday School, and baking. They shared their talents—leading us in Dance Practice and Greek School. They gave of their treasure—pouring into each of us, this church community. And now, it's our time.

For me, stewardship started small. I moved to Memphis, TN at age 23 for a new job, and while most everything in my life was new, going to church remained my one constant.


I was a rather shy newcomer to the Greek Orthodox Church in Memphis (also named Annunciation). About a year into my time there, I was approached about teaching Sunday School.

My first reaction was "Me?" Can I do that? I travel too much, I'm too busy, the list goes on and on. But I then thought, well, why not carve out time? I'm already going to church—if there is anything I should be giving my time to, it's my church, it's my faith, right??

So, I said yes. I told myself that I'll do this just for one year. And just every other Sunday. I thought I'd quietly bow out after that. But I really enjoyed it. I connected with the students. With the community. With the Church. That one small "yes" led to another-joining Young Adult League-and another, volunteering at the Food Festival. So, what I thought would just be one year of volunteering turned into five straight years!

Eventually, I moved back home to Sacramento, and within a few months, I was approached about teaching Sunday School. I thought, okay, I can do this! I've done it before. I'll do it for this year and that's it. Well, I've now been teaching for 4 years!





That's stewardship. Sharing your time, your talents, and your treasure—not because you have to, but because you want to. Because your faith matters. And because—just



maybe—you'll find joy in the giving.

So let me ask you—what's your "yes"? Maybe it's:

- "I can give an hour."
- "I'll bake one batch."

I'm honored to share what stewardship means to me.




For a brief moment, I'd like to ask you to close your eyes. Once your eyes are closed, I want you to think about someone whom you deeply admire.



Who comes to mind? What makes them so special to you? Why do you admire them?

Please open your eyes.



Like so many who built this parish and community, they were proud and hardearned members of what many historians refer to as the "greatest generation." A generation born between 1900 and 1930 who led with duty, sacrifice and faithful devotion. A generation who met extraordinary challenges and somehow always



found solutions. They were builders, givers and they were no fuss.













My Pappou carried a 6th grade education, was conscripted into the army for 2 countries, came to America with very little and built a life anchored in generosity, compassion and devotion to our faith.

My Yiayia, whom some of you remember very well, was the daughter of hay farmers, and remarkably went on to earn a Masters degree. There weren't many people, let alone women, born in 1919 who could claim that unique distinction. She spent 40 years as a teacher and Director of Sunday School here at Annunciation. 40 years. As my good friend Nick Rotas will tell you, Yiayia Lucille dished out love and discipline in equal measure.

When it came to the festival, Yiayia had a tendency to "TELL YOU" when and where you were needed, she didn't have much regard for how busy you were. "God and this church need you," she'd say with a sly grin, "...I'll ask for forgiveness about my management style later.":)

When I was much younger, and protesting going to church, I asked Yiayia if she believed God had a camera in the narthex and measured church attendance with a spreadsheet. She said YES...then she asked..."what's a spreadsheet?!":)

And when I was older, Yiayia would tell me that the greatest gift I will ever receive in my life is my Orthodox Christian faith. She'd say - it's your armor, it's your compass, it will guide and protect you in everything. She'd remind me that ordinary people went to extraordinary measures and gave **EVERYTHING** to preserve our faith, culture and language against unimaginable conditions. And she'd challenge me by asking me the following - what are you going to do with this gift?

Yiayia's creed was simple - never take our faith for granted. Give back to it. Make your life a life of faith in action in service to Christ. AND always strive to make something better than how you found it. Always do your part to make something better in service to God. That, for me, is stewardship.

In 2019, I was fortunate to visit Constantinople and our Mother Church, and especially fortunate to receive holy communion from the Patriarch. It was a beautiful and eye-opening experience for me. I was struck by the humility of the Fenar and how remarkably accessible the Patriarch was. I was also struck by how challenging it is to practice Orthodox Christianity in Constantinople despite it being the home of the Patriarch. The reasons for this are well documented, and as I had time to think about my experience, I came back to my Yiayia's teachings:

Never take our faith for granted... It's the greatest gift you will ever receive... What will you do with this gift...

What I've learned is that our faith, church and parish community grow in direct proportion to the time, talent and treasure we offer it. They work hand in hand. Brick by brick, volunteer hour by volunteer hour, and dollar by dollar, Annunciation













thrives today because of those who've come before us and those today, ALL OF YOU, who offer your time, talent and treasure.

Stewardship inspires me because I want to do my part to ensure our faith, culture and community thrive. I want to honor those who came before us...and I want to give my time, talent and treasure to thank God for the blessings in my life, including meeting Deanna, my lovely wife, right here at Annunciation when I was a **volunteer steward** at the festival:)

In closing, as Fr Vinnie has shared, today is indeed meant to be a celebration. A celebration to honor, recognize and thank **YOU**, our stewards, for the generosity and love you show to our faith, parish and community. We hope it will be the first of many Stewardship Appreciation Days, and we hope it will further open a door for us to learn and grow together as a parish in service to the extraordinary gift we share together - the gift of our faith. When the stewardship committee asked me to speak on this most imperative topic, I thought — how can I speak on something so important when I am knee-deep in one of the most chaotic seasons of my life? Four children, in four different schools, in four different directions! But once my children fell asleep on the way home from church, and there was quiet – fleeting quiet...but quiet — I thought, now is exactly the time when I should be sharing and setting this example. I could stand up here with the attention of the congregation and talk about why monetary donation is so critical – but we all know this. Instead, I wanted to share why giving is a core value in our family, and how I lead with this value as a mother. A mother who learned from her mother

Growing up I moved around a great deal due to my late father being a partner with Ernst & Young. A new house, a new school, the process of putting myself out there to make friends always followed by some uncertainty. But there was always an anchor, a constant, a cement that grounded us each time we had to start over. That anchor was the church — my mother made sure each time we built a new house that we were in close proximity to what would center us. She set that example, and that became the story that lit me up. This example became my path in motherhood as well, and I am indebted to her for the teaching and grounding she instilled. Unknowingly really, I did the same thing with our family when we made the move to Granite Bay just two and half years ago. And with focused intention, we chose for Annunciation to be our constant as well — to be the place where we shared our time, talents and treasure.

With a masters degree in journalism and a professional history in PR and the newsroom, stories are what have always ignited me. Stories surrounding the moments when someone's life changes because of a simple act of kindness, or when they realize that giving is indeed fulfilling. That is stewardship. That is love in action











But how do we tell that story? And more importantly, how do we live that story as an example to our children; just as the example has been shown and shared in this parish for over one hundred years! I believe that stewardship is a sacred responsibility—a way of living that reflects gratitude for God's blessings and a commitment to giving back with intention, love and great purpose. At Annunciation, stewardship isn't just about financial contributions; it's about being present, participating, and nurturing the life of our parish through our time, talents, and treasure. 1 Peter 4:10–11 tell us "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ."

As a mother, I often find that the lens through which I view stewardship is deeply shaped by how I want my children to experience faith, community, and compassion. I want to model a life of service—not just attending church, but being the Church. That means showing up, offering what I know how to do best, and giving financially to the best of my ability. Motherhood, paired with living by example, is one of the most powerful ways to teach children the importance of giving, and how we can all tell our stories. Children learn by observation and they internalize these actions as normal and worthwhile. This tells me all those countless hours giving time in the costume closet are making an impression! This example of service is impactful; they see giving this time to the church as normal, and something mama does regularly to serve the community and God.

And because they see this behavior as normal and ongoing, it then becomes part of the family culture and the story I want to tell. I always want to model that generosity isn't just something you do occasionally; it's a way of living. And living this way, living Christ-like, allows me to convey that this type of service renders both joy and fulfillment. My hope is that it helps them associate giving — not with sacrifice, but with purpose. These instances are when when we see the stories piece together. These stories are much more impactful than abstract lessons. They get to see the story being lived as they adopt the practice as normal. Living by example doesn't just tell children what's important—it shows them.

To me, stewardship is a living expression of gratitude—an active, ongoing commitment to give back to God with love and purpose. At Annunciation, I view stewardship not as an obligation, but as a privilege. It's how I say "thank you" through my time, talents, and treasure.

#### Time

I strive to give my time by showing up—not only for services every Sunday, but also for events, various ministries, and moments that bring our community together. Whether it's volunteering at the festival, sourcing in the costume closet for hours on end, providing meals to our dancers and DSG family during live week, or simply lending a hand when someone needs support, I see my time as an offering—one that strengthens our bonds and helps sustain the rhythm of parish life, and set an ongoing example for our children.



#### **Talent**

God gives each of us unique talents, and it's our duty to share them. In Romans 12: 6-7, we learn that "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching" I try to use my skills in ways that support the church's mission—whether that means helping with ministry communications, being a part of the Sunday School board, or organizing outreach efforts. Offering our talents are how we bring the Church to life beyond the walls of this building.



#### Treasure

Supporting the church financially is also a vital expression of stewardship. My contributions are prayerful investments in our future—a way to ensure that the next generation has the same opportunities to grow in faith, culture, and fellowship. I give as a reflection of trust in God's provision and a desire to keep our church thriving. Ultimately, stewardship is about love in action. It's how we live our faith daily, care for our spiritual home, and ensure that Annunciation continues to be a place of worship and growth.



In closing, I'd like to sign off with an excerpt from my daughter Antonia's recent oratorical festival speech; The practice of stewardship lays a beautiful foundation to be philanthropic. Jesus is the doorway to eternal life as is stewardship in an avenue to so many more philanthropic opportunities. How can you use your time, talents and treasure to live in His image and likeness?


## SACRAMENTO GREEK FESTIVAL

If you lived in Sacramento in the 1980's, you might remember this festival logo making it's way around town via the SacRT busses.

## SACRAMENTO GREEK FESTIVAL

Demetre Fotos, youngest of the six Fotos siblings, is an artistic powerhouse. He's been with the Festival since the start–62 years ago; he's designed much of the Festival's visual aesthetic with his artwork. The few pictures shown here are but a miniscule caption of the depth of Demetre's contribution.

In the early years, Demetre did logos, signage, and danced with The Olympians – a Sacramento dance group which predated FDF. In 1972, with a team of 3 others, he built the Erectheum and the Caryatids. In 1975, Demetre spent hundreds of hours painting the Heritage Panels, whose information was researched by sisters, Georgia Econome and Anne Manolis. Demetre has carefully erected the panels for nearly every festival for the past 50 years. In recent years, with the bulk of his art completed, he would lovingly collect the menus, revising or replacing them as needed, and redeploying them for the next festival. And now, after 62 years of commitment, Demetre Fotos is hanging up his festival paintbrush. AXIOS!

Demetre's artistic contributions and vibrant spirit serve as a wonderful example of how we can give our time and talent to benefit the Festival and our Annunciation Church. He is truly an inspiration; we are greatful for his decades of service.

As Demetre knows, volunteering at the Festival is a great way to give back to our church and make new friends. We hope you'll join us over the summer and for the three-day event the first weekend of October. Here are our greatest needs:

- Pre-Festival Labor: We need all hands on deck to make the mass quantities of food we serve our 10,000 guests. Our next baking day, Kourambiethes (set for June 23), and all our other delicious foods, require upwards of 50 volunteers per day, to make our goods. The current baking schedule is below, but keep an eye out for Friday emails and Sunday Bulletins with more up to date info. The old adage still rings true... Many hands make light work.
- Festival Labor: Nearly every festival booth chair provided the same feedback: "We need more volunteers!" We hope you'll consider joining us for a volunteer shift. It's a great way to connect with friends and meet new people. Recruitment will begin in late summer.

#### Wednesday: St. Savvas of Kalymnos-Icons, Humility & Service

Kalymnos was the next stop, where campers explored the quiet holiness of St. Savvas. They created their own icons and used natural sea sponges to paint beautiful Kalymnian landscapes—honoring the island's famed sponge divers.

#### Thursday: St. Nektarios of Aegina – Patience & Wisdom

The journey continued to Aegina, where campers met St. Nektarios, a saint known for his love of learning, patience in trials, and devotion to others. In his honor, each camper assembled an IOCC School Kit filled with essential supplies that will be sent to children in need around the world—living out his legacy of education and compassion.
